Elaborating and Transmitting Knowledge, from the 4th millennium BCE to the 3rd millennium ACE

This series of lectures explores the development and transmission of knowledge by, or about, the ancient societies of West Asia. The aim is to explore the conditions under which knowledge emerges, is applied and is transmitted, based on the analysis of various cuneiform sources. Emphasis will be placed on the context in which these documents were produced, to better understand the human agents and their motivations, whether individuals, families, or political, economic and/or religious institutions. From the outset, the program was conceived without limits as to geography, chronology or typology of knowledge, to offer a varied panel of current research. We will be looking not only at metrology, administration, accounting and divinatory knowledge, but also at the families of scholars and/or experts in scribal art, and their respective links with political power. From a reflexive perspective, the lecture series will also address our own current way of teaching the history of these cuneiform societies, as well as the new digital technologies that enable us to elaborate new knowledge.
